Understanding McKinney-Vento Assistance for Homeless Youth Mississinewa Community Schools

What is the definition of homeless?

- 1. Children and youth who:
 - a. share the housing of other persons due to loss of housing, economic hardship, or a similar reason;
 - b. are living in motels, hotels, trailer parks, or camping grounds due to the lack of alternative accommodations;
 - c. are living in emergency or transitional shelters;
 - d. are abandoned in hospitals.
- 2. Children and youth who have a primary nighttime residence that is a public or private place not designed for or ordinarily used as a regular sleeping accommodation for human beings.
- 3. Children and youth who are living in cars, parks, public spaces, abandoned buildings, substandard housing, bus or train stations, or similar settings.
- 4. Children of migrant or seasonal workers who qualify as homeless because they are living in circumstances described in the first three categories.

Who do I notify, if I suspect a student is homeless?

If you suspect a student is homeless, notify your assistant principal. The assistant principal will notify Emily Bainter, Mississinewa's ESSA POC. Emily, the assistant principal, and/or the home school coordinator will communicate with the student and parents.

What can we provide for homeless students?

- Free breakfast and lunch; Boomerang Backpacks (weekend food); school supplies; connecting families with Red Cross (shelter, food, clothing, supplies); connecting families with food pantries at local churches; helping families sign up for Medicaid; bus transportation; helping families sign up for food stamps; offer hygiene supplies and cleaning supplies (items not covered by food stamps); offer laundry facilities; offer bathroom/shower facilities before and after school with hygiene supplies; clothing
- Before families qualify for Medicaid: monetary support for glasses, dental care, doctor appointments, and prescription refills
- Help students, who have been kicked out of their homes, find housing with family members or foster care
